Room 3's visit to Tangiteroria School



On Thursday, 14th September, Room 3 spent the day with students at Tangiteroria School, which is a Silver EnviroSchool. They were also awarded a Northland Regional Council Environmental Action in Education Award in 2022. Part of Tangiteroria's kaupapa is to share their environmental learning with other schools. Similar in size to our school, our students very quickly connected with their

Tangiteroria hosts, enjoying a day of learning and play in their ngahere, and on their fabulous playground equipment.



Tangiteroria School boasts a very special patch of regenerating native bush, which has many well established rimu, kauri, kohekohe, mapou, and ponga. We learned about how the school is protecting native species through predator control, and preventing kauri diabaek. A kauri diabaek station is act up at the antrance

dieback. A kauri dieback station is set up at the entrance to the ngahere, where all footwear is cleaned and brushed before entering. We saw two possum traps that were obviously doing their jobs! Our first activity was learning about native birds, their habitat, nests, and diet. In small groups the tamariki searched for hidden native birds (soft

toys), then read the information card that was provided. They then created a nest for their bird, and finally sourced appropriate food from Mrs Hakaraia. We then explored the outer edges of the bush area, where we all enjoyed the challenge of the 'mud run' - a very steep track that was navigated by holding on to a rope...or sliding down in spectacular fashion. We saw many

interesting trees, including seedlings; and heard several birds calling. The final activity of the day was 'Animal Survival'. We learned about how predators, disease, natural disasters, and man impacts on the survival of different species. Students were in groups - herbivores, carnivores, disasters - while one senior student was

'man'. Students had to protect themselves from being caught, and once they had lost their 4 lives they had to return to base. This was an enormously fun way of learning about the threats to our natural environment and creatures.





We certainly came back brimming with enthusiasm, and thinking of ways to develop part of our school grounds.



Tangiteroria School's PTA provided a

sausage sizzle for lunch, which was very well received after such an active morning. Huge thanks to Eden Hakaraia and her class for inviting us, and to all the students for their hospitality. We had a fabulous day. Thanks also to Maureen Evans, Andrew Hames, and Duncan Brady for providing transport. We appreciate it.
